
Teaching Notes: GREAT BIG SOFTIE

ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR

Australian-born Shane McG has drawn robots, monsters and cars ever since he was knee high to a grasshopper. When he got a bit taller, he moved to London where he illustrated for newspapers, magazines, design studios and advertising agencies as well as painting big abstract canvases in his East London warehouse studio.

Shane now lives back in his hometown of Melbourne with his husband. He illustrates almost exclusively for picture books these days which he loves. He feels he has come full circle as he once again draws robots, monsters and cars. He loves bush walking, running around the park, eating gluten-free cake and drinking tea as he watches his ginger cat destroy the begonias.



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Great Big Softie is a rip-roaring story about a soft-hearted monster who decides that to fit in with other monsters, he must perform some monstrous deeds. He then must work out whether to continue in this way or follow his heart. Key themes of wanting to fit in, staying true to yourself, being kind and forgiveness run through this book, making it a great starting point for discussions about integrity, inclusivity and differences.

DISCUSSION TOPICS

Read the book together, asking questions throughout.

- I. Introduce *Great Big Softie* to the children and ask them what they think the book might be about.
- 2. What does the phrase 'great big softie' mean?
- 3. Elliot wants to fit in with the other monsters and therefore, he must change. Why can't he just be himself? Ask the children if they have ever had to change their behaviour to fit in? Is this wrong, or right?
- 4. How does Elliot feel when he scares a little girl on her bike? What does he then do?
- 5. Does Elliot find it difficult to say 'sorry'? Talk about times we've said 'sorry'. How easy or difficult is it to say this word? Do you feel better after you've said it?
- 6. Is it better to 'fit in' or 'be yourself?
- 7. The little girl decides to forgive Elliot for scaring her. Have you ever forgiven somebody? How does it make you feel?
- 8. After reading the book, ask them what did they think of the story? Which was their favourite part and why?


