Synopsis





Discussion Topics

- I. Show the children the front cover of the book. Ask them if they can read the title. Can they guess which one is Ruby and which one is Graham?
- 2. Look closely at the front cover illustration. Can you infer anything about Ruby and Graham's personalities?
- 3. After reading the story, ask the children who they are more similar to, Ruby or Graham? (They can take the quiz to find out for sure!)
- 4. Why do you think it is important to tidy your toys away after you have finished playing?
- 5. Ruby worries that people will not like her if she stops partying and having fun all the time. Can you think of reasons why she might feel this way?
- 6. Have you ever wanted to be more like someone else? What characteristics do you see in your friends that you would like to imitate?
- 7. Can you explain what Ruby and Graham learnt from each other?


